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exploring the interplay of university learning and civic culture over the centuries this book provides a novel perspective on the history of both universities and cities an innovative series of studies by several distinguished scholars examines the complex relations of major cities associated with key moments in the history of higher learning in the west

one of the most influential institutions of higher learning in the world the university of chicago has a powerful and distinct identity and its name is synonymous with intellectual rigour john w boyer presents a fascinating narrative of a legendary academic community one that brings to light the nature of its academic culture and curricula the experience of its students its engagement with chicago s civic community and the conditions that have enabled the university to survive and sustain itself through decades of change

the inauguration of robert maynard hutchins as the fifth president of the university of chicago in 1929 coincided with a drastically changed social and economic climate throughout the world and hutchins himself opened an era of tumultuous reform and debate within the university in the midst of the changes hutchins started and the intense feelings they stirred william h mcneill arrived at the university to pursue his education in hutchins university he tells what it was like to come of age as a undergraduate in those heady times hutchins scathing opposition to the departmentalization of learning and his resounding call for reforms in general education sparked controversy and fueled debate on campus and off it became a struggle for the heart and soul of higher education and mcneill as a student and then as an instructor was a participant his account of the university s history is laced with personal reminiscences encounters with influential fellow scholars such as richard mckee r s crane and david daiches and details drawn from hutchins papers and other archives mcneill sketches the interplay of personalities with changing circumstances of the depression war and postwar eras but his central concern is with the institutional life of the university showing how student behavior staff and faculty activity and even the hyde park neighborhood all revolved around the charismatic figure of robert maynard hutchins shaped by him and in reaction against him successive transformations of the college and the tribulations of the ideal of general or liberal education are central to much of the story but the memoir also explores how the university was affected by such events as red scares the remarkably successful round table radio broadcasts the abolition of big time football and the inauguration of the nuclear age under the west stands of stagg field in 1942 in short hutchins university sketches an extraordinarily vibrant period for the university of chicago and for american higher education it will revive old controversies among veterans from those times and may provoke others to reflect anew about the proper role of higher education in american society

a reissue of a charming little illustrated volume originally published in 1974 which walks the reader through the highlights of the history of the university of california

with roots reaching back to 1819 the university of cincinnati has long been at the frontier of higher education in the ohio valley while it has aspired to fulfill its mission to serve the public good some residents particularly those living near campus have wondered how university decisions benefited the city at large long a municipal university uc struggled to

serve a broad diverse population even as Cincinnati itself struggled in the late twentieth century through it all the university has maintained its importance to the city and its alumni in service to the city a history of the university of Cincinnati the first history of the university written in over fifty years explores the evolving complex relationship between UC and the city of Cincinnati in service to the city casts an unvarnished lens on the details of student demographics faculty research curricular changes and athletic controversy to challenges associated with campus architecture and planning neighborhood relations regional and national consequences of urban decline and the roles of municipal state and federal governments within American higher education urban environmental historian David Stradling traces UC's story through starts and stops growth and contraction in the 1870s the institution began its transformation into a comprehensive municipal university located in America's thriving heartland expansion continued through mergers with Cincinnati College Conservatory of Music and Cincinnati Medical College among others in 1977 university president Warren Bennis and Governor Jim Rhodes signed papers ending UC's municipal status while securing its future as part of the state university system of Ohio UC maintains its strong relationship with Cincinnati pioneering countless community and regionally oriented programs from its expanding co-op education system the first in the nation to the Niehoff Urban Studio Stradling describes the social and political activism of UC students and faculty front and center in the civil rights and women's rights movements as well as the public health and environmental movements often they struggled to change the culture within their own institution which at times appeared conservative or reactionary drawing on archival research Stradling recounts in lively prose and through dozens of illustrations two hundred years of UC history setting the story in the context of changes within higher education in the United States with the cost of higher education on the minds of legislators and the public questions first posed by Daniel Drake in 1819 upon the founding of Cincinnati College remain relevant who should the college serve what and how should students learn how can we pay for it in service to the city encourages readers to consider how the university of Cincinnati with a history so entwined with its city can balance its urban serving tradition with its aspiration to be a leader global research university

this fresh and readable account gives a complete history of the university of Oxford from its beginnings in the eleventh century to the present day written by one of the leading authorities on the history of universities internationally it traces Oxford's improbable rise from provincial backwater to one of the world's leading centres of research and teaching Laurence Brockliss sees Oxford's history as one of discontinuity as much as continuity describing it in four distinct parts first he explores Oxford as the Catholic university in the centuries before the reformation when it was principally a clerical studium serving the needs of the Western Church then as the Anglican university in the years from 1534 to 1845 when Oxford was confessionally closed to other religions it trained the next generation of ministers of the Church of England and acted as a finishing school for the sons of the gentry and the well to do after 1845 the imperial university saw the emergence over the following century of a new Oxford a university which was still elitist but now non-confessional became open to women as well as men took students from all round the empire and was held together at least until 1914 by a novel concept of Christian service the

final part the world university takes the story forward from 1945 to the present day and describes oxford s development as a modern meritocratic and secular university with an ever growing commitment to high quality academic research throughout the book oxford s history is placed in the wider context of the history of higher education in the uk europe and the world this helps to show how singular oxford s evolution has been a story not of entitlement but of hard work difficult decisions and a creative use of limited resources and advantages to keep its destiny in its own hands

thomas blantz s monumental the university of notre dame a history tells the story of the renowned catholic university s growth and development from a primitive grade school and high school founded in 1842 by the congregation of holy cross in the wilds of northern indiana to the acclaimed undergraduate and research institution it became by the early twenty first century it s growth was not always smooth slowed at times by wars financial challenges fires and illnesses it is the story both of a successful institution and the men and women who made it so father edward sorin c s c the twenty eight year old french priest and visionary founder father william corby c s c later two term notre dame president who gave absolution to the soldiers of the irish brigade at the battle of gettysburg the hundreds of holy cross brothers sisters and priests whose faithful service in classrooms student residence halls and across campus kept the university progressing through difficult years a dedicated lay faculty teaching too many classes for too few dollars to assure the university would survive knute rockne a successful chemistry teacher but an even more successful football coach elevating notre dame to national athletic prominence father theodore m hesburgh c s c president for thirty five years and 325 undergraduate young women who were first to enter notre dame in 1972 among thousands of others blantz captures the strong connections that exist between notre dame s founding and early life and today s university alumni faculty students friends of the university and fans of the fighting irish will want to own this indispensable definitive history of one of america s leading universities simultaneously detailed and documented yet lively and interesting the university of notre dame a history is the most complete and up to date history of the university available

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
